

Christmas Street Party!

Thousands expected at spectacular City Centre event on Sunday 21 November

The festive season will get underway in St Albans District with a fantastic Christmas street party.

Much of the City Centre will be closed to traffic for the free-to-attend event – called the St Albans Christmas Cracker – which was cancelled last year because of the pandemic.

The fun will start at noon on Sunday 21 November and carry on until darkness falls around 5pm when the Christmas lights will be switched on after a countdown.

Among the attractions will be dozens of food, drink and gift stalls, Santa's grotto, funfair rides and live music from some of the District's most talented musicians.

Olympic legend Max Whitlock helped open Harpenden's new leisure centre, page 5. Other highlights of the festive season across the District are:

St Albans District Mayor's Carol Concert – join the Mayor, Councillor Edgar Hill, for traditional carol singing at the Clock Tower in the City Centre on Sunday 12 December, 4pm to 4.45pm.

in the High Street on Sunday 28 November from noon to 6pm, including the Farmers' Market, Santa's grotto, a funfair, live music and a procession from 3pm from Sun Lane with the lights being switched on at 5pm.

Redbourn Christmas Market – there will be some 90 stalls selling a wide range of goods along with takeaway food and drink in the High Street and Cumberland Gardens on Sunday 28 November.

Secure Your Vote

If you received a canvass form or letter checking who is registered to vote at your address and haven't yet responded, it's important to do so now.

If you have just moved into your new property, you'll also need to register to vote individually. This can be done online by visiting **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote**. If you don't register, you may lose your right to vote at next year's local elections.

SKATE PARK

Plans to create an exciting outdoor skate park in St Albans are being considered.

The park would cater for the increasingly popular activities of riding skateboards, BMX bikes, roller skates and scooters.

A petition calling for a skate park was submitted to the Council earlier this year and a working party has been set up to look at the issue in depth.

The group will seek to establish a suitable location as well as determine how the park will be funded with community groups consulted throughout. It is due to report on progress to a meeting of the Public Realm Committee on Wednesday 24 November.

Bonfire Plea

Residents are reminded to avoid having bonfires and to follow advice on letting off fireworks.

Gusts of smoke from bonfires can impact on people who are suffering from COVID or have other health issues such as a respiratory illness.

In addition, bonfires can result in calls to the emergency services, putting extra pressure on their resources.

The RSPCA has issued advice on how to make fireworks less

frightening for dogs and other animals.

Residents celebrating Bonfire Night, Diwali, the New Year or other occasions should follow the guidelines to minimise the risk of causing an incident.

The bangs and cracks of fireworks can be a terrifying experience for dogs as they have highly sensitive hearing.

Eco Issues

Active Travel Boost

A plan to create better cycling and walking routes in St Albans District is to be drawn up to encourage active travel.

St Albans City and District Council (SADC) is to work with Hertfordshire County Council, the highways authority for the area, on the project.

The two councils have signed an agreement detailing their commitment to produce a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan.

Such plans are a new approach to identifying cycling and walking opportunities at a local level.

They are a long-term approach aimed at developing cycling and walking networks over a 10-year period and form a key part of the Government's strategy to increase the number of trips made on foot or by cycle.

One of the Council's main priorities is tackling the climate emergency with the promotion of green travel being one of the actions it is taking.



Green Flags

Five Green Flag awards have been given to parks and other open spaces managed by the Council.

Verulamium and Clarence Parks, Hatfield Road Cemetery and the Sopwell Nunnery were all given the national honour.

In addition, Verulamium achieved coveted Green Heritage Site Accreditation, supported by Historic England, for the care shown to its major features.

Green Flags are an international quality mark for parks and green spaces with the awards now in their 25th year.

Help Improve Verulamium Park

Visitors enjoying historic Verulamium Park in St Albans are being urged to help improve the surrounding environment by not feeding the birds.

The practice may seem like a nice and harmless thing to do – but it has been causing problems at the park's two artificial lakes.

Feeding encourages birds to settle around the park rather than follow their natural migration paths. This causes overcrowding with more birds coming to the park than the natural habitat can sustain.

An excess of bird droppings, combined with discarded food, is adding more organic material to the already heavily-silted lakes. This can result in unsightly, odorous algae blooms and lowers water quality.

In the long-term, we are working with the Environment Agency and other partners on the Revitalising the Ver project.

This multi-million scheme will return the Ver to its natural course as it flows through the park and the Sopwell area of St Albans.


Fibre & Form

Saturday 27 November 2021 – Sunday 17 April 2022, Museum + Gallery, Free.

The first major exhibition of sculptural textile work by acclaimed artist Anna Ray. The focus is on large-scale sculptural pieces created by Ray over the past 20 years. It features two new sculptures, Mesh and Rosette, which were sculpted during the lockdowns as well as Ray's seminal wall piece, Margate Knot, originally produced for an exhibition at Turner Contemporary in 2017.

HARPENDEN LEISURE CENTRE'S OFFICIAL OPENING



Olympic gold medal winning gymnast Max Whitlock helped open Harpenden's new multimillion pound leisure centre.

Max, who won his third Olympic gold at the pommel horse in Tokyo this summer, was born and brought up a few miles from the centre.




He assisted the Mayor of St Albans City and District, Councillor Edgar Hill, with the official ribbon-cutting.

Joining them was badminton star Gail Emms who won silver at the 2004 Olympic Games.

Customers of Harpenden Leisure Centre, sports clubs and school and community groups were also present at the launch of the centre in Rothamsted Park.

They enjoyed a number of familyfriendly games and activities including tennis sessions.

The centre was rebuilt by the Council as part of a £20 million project and is managed by leisure contractor 1Life. It has built up a growing membership of almost 4,000 with more than 1,500 local children on the Swim School swimming lesson programme.



Centre's Opening

A new culture centre named after Eric Morecambe has been officially opened with residents enjoying a launch day event of shows, workshops and other attractions.

The Eric Morecambe Centre (EMC) in Harpenden includes a 511-seat theatre, an exhibition space with two functions rooms, a local history room, bars on two floors and a coffee shop with views across Rothamsted Park.

It was constructed on the site of the town's former sports centre and officially opened by St Albans District Mayor, Councillor Edgar Hill, along with Eric's daughter Gail Stuart.

The EMC was built by the Council to replace ageing Harpenden Public Halls as part of a £20 million regeneration project. It is also managed by 1Life.

Eric was a Harpenden resident at the height of his international fame as a comedy double act alongside Ernie Wise.

The EMC's theatre boasts state-of-the-art production equipment to allow major touring shows to be staged as well as those put on by local groups.





Winter Health – advice from the NHS

It's important to take action during the winter to look after your own health as well as the health of your friends and family.

Winter is a busy time for the NHS and there are a huge range of services available, so knowing the best place to go to get the right help is vital.

Using the right NHS service first time is better for you and helps the NHS to make sure that resources are used in the best way.

There are things we can all do to be ready for whatever winter throws at us.

These including keeping a wellstocked medicine cabinet at home, getting your flu vaccination and following COVID guidance such as getting your vaccine or booster when invited.

If you do fall ill with a cold or flu, it is best to rest, keep warm, drink plenty of fluids and take painkillers such as paracetamol and ibuprofen.

When you are unwell, wash your hands thoroughly and regularly and stay away from care homes and health clinics for 48 hours after your symptoms end.

If you have an illness that just won't go away, make an appointment to see your GP or practice nurse or speak to them on the phone.

CCTV Boosted

CCTV cameras have been installed at Verulamium Park to ensure it remains a safe environment for residents and visitors.

The cameras have been placed at three strategic locations and will be in operation 24/7, monitored from a central control room where other parts of the City are covered.

If an operator spots any antisocial behaviour or suspicious activity, they will alert the police so that they can respond immediately.





Burglary Prevention

When looking at how best to secure your home, start from the outside and work your way in.

Make sure you always lock any garden gates and keep fences in good repair. Laying down some gravel is a good deterrent as it is noisy to walk on.

Thorny plants or a trellis on top of perimeter fences can provide a hazard for intruders as do outside lights.

Make a habit out of checking ground floor windows are closed

and locked when you go to bed. Upstairs windows should be locked when the house is unoccupied.

You can make you homes even safer by installing some extra security devices such as cameras and alarms.

Be a good neighbour and keep an eye out for unusual callers in your neighbourhood and don't be afraid to call the police on 101 or in an emergency dial 999.

Residents are being urged to help the environment by signing up to have their Council Tax bills sent electronically.

By agreeing to ditch paper bills, you will be helping to preserve precious resources as well as saving Council Tax payers money.

It costs more than 40p to print and post a bill with thousands of households having to be contacted each year.

A topping out ceremony has been held for the Council's major City Centre development.

The occasion marked a key milestone of the £60 million project, the completion of the reinforced steel frame.

Contractors Morgan Sindall invited Councillors, key stakeholders and some of its workforce to sign one of the concrete columns to mark the event.

The development is being constructed on the site of a former police station and NHS clinic which have been demolished.

It will include a residential block adjacent to a commercial one with the buildings separated by a landscaped pedestrian walkway that will wind through a revitalised Quaker Garden.

There will be 93 new homes including 60 for sale at market price and 33 for social rent. There will also be around 6,000 square metres of business space and 100 car parking spaces. It is due for completion in October next year.

Community Governance

The Council will be conducting a community governance review of the District next year.

This will look at governance arrangements at parish and town council level to ensure they reflect local identities and are effective.

The review may consider various issues including whether to create a new parish or town council or alter electoral arrangements such as the number of wards or councillors.

It can also look at whether to change boundaries or group a number of parish councils together.

More than 15,000 people attended the highlight of the District's Food and Drink Festival – the St Albans Feastival.

Huge crowds packed the City Centre for the return of the family event that was cancelled last year because of the COVID pandemic.

The many attractions included 70 stalls showcasing an astonishing variety of food and drink products, many from local suppliers. There was also a cookery theatre, charity fun fair, and a kids' zone with free arts and crafts activities.

Live music was provided by local musicians from two separate stages to add to the atmosphere.

A number of COVID precautions were taken, including using some extra streets and public areas to provide more space. There were multiple hand sanitiser stations, free disposable face masks and a team of cleaners were on duty.

The Food and Drink Festival is organised by the Council with the help a number of partners including SA Law and St Albans BID. Its aim is to promote all aspects of the District's food and drink industry.
