## New voter ID rule comes into force at May elections

St Albans City & District Council

Local elections are happening on Thursday 4 May – with voters required to show photographic ID at polling stations for the first time.

Around one third of seats at St Albans City and District Council are up for election this year.

There are also full elections for the District's nine Parish and Town Councils – Colney Heath, Harpenden, Harpenden Rural, London Colney, Redbourn, St Michael, St Stephen, Sandridge and Wheathampstead.

The new legislation means that you need to present an accepted form of ID to vote at a polling station. This includes a UK passport or driver's licence.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online.

If you cannot present accepted ID, you will not be able to vote on the day.

The District Council has important responsibilities for a wide range of public services including social housing, recycling, planning, parks, car parking and leisure centres.

Town and Parish Councils also have powers over many local matters including some open spaces and community buildings.

So, it is important for residents not to lose their say in May.

You should also note that the deadline to register to vote if you are not already registered is Monday 17 April.

### Parish Council boundary changes

We have concluded a Community Governance review of the nine Parish and Town Councils within our area.

The review considered what, if any, changes were needed to Parish and Town Council wards and boundaries. During 2022, two public consultations were held during which residents were encouraged to give their views.

Changes to some boundaries will come into effect in time for the Parish and Town Council elections on Thursday 4 May.

For Council Tax purposes, these changes are effective from the 1 April 2023.

## Housing strategy published

A housing strategy for St Albans District – including commitments to improve energy efficiency and build more homes for social rent – has been published.

The strategy provides a guide for the Council's future housing activities and policies over the next three years.

It includes key commitments to tackle the issues of housing need and demand.

These include delivering new social housing, promoting sustainability, ensuring an efficient supply of temporary accommodation and meeting the needs of vulnerable people.

# Eco Issues



### Car parking strategy

We have adopted a new eco-friendly car parking strategy following a public consultation.

As well as tackling climate change, the strategy aims to improve accessibility, make best use of digital technology and ensure efficient enforcement.

There are a series of projects to achieve the main goals such as measures to reduce carbon emissions and encourage eco-friendly transport.

These include the introduction of paperless permits and the promotion of car clubs.

We operate 15 fee-paying car parks providing almost 3,000 spaces including more than 100 disabled bays. In addition, we are responsible for on-street parking. You can view the strategy at: **bit.ly/3HNwdFw**.

Residents can improve the energy efficiency of their homes and reduce bills with advice from the St Albans Home Energy Support Service.

## Emissions free parks equipment

Eco-friendly equipment is being used to maintain our parks and green spaces across the District.

John O'Conner – our grounds maintenance contractor – is ditching petrol-driven machines for battery-powered ones.

The switch is in keeping with our commitment to tackling climate change by cutting emissions to net zero across the District by 2030.

Among the all-electric equipment now being used are an all-terrain vehicle for park patrols, two vans and a JCB excavator for digging and heavy-lifting work.

A range of battery-powered hand-held equipment is also being used including strimmers, leaf blowers and hedge cutters.


## **How Council Tax is calculated**

#### Charges, and why they vary between areas

St Albans City and District Council also collects Council Tax on behalf of Hertfordshire County Council, Hertfordshire Police and Crime Commissioner and the Town and Parish Councils in the District.

The actual charge for each band varies from area to area. This is because certain services are provided by the District Council in some areas, but by the Town or Parish Council in others.

Town and Parish Councils have the freedom to set their own precepts. The amount you pay depends on where you live.

## You can help the police solve crime and take steps to prevent it happening to you by joining OWL (Online Watch Link) at www.owl.co.uk/herts.

By signing up, you will receive messages, usually via email, about issues affecting your local area including neighbourhood burglaries with relevant crime prevention advice.



Penny Brown from Hertfordshire Police Community Safety Unit said: "It's so quick and simple to sign up and you just need to read the messages and act on any crime prevention advice."

You can also download the OWL crime alerts app and receive pop-up notifications for important messages like high risk missing people or emergencies.

Penny added: "Over 20,000 households in St Albans District are already signed up to OWL – over a third – but we are keen to make sure more residents benefit from our messages to help prevent and detect crime and keep our communities safer."

## Make sure you don't get dipped



Purse dipping continues to be one of the neighbourhood priorities for St Albans District.

Plain-clothed and high-visibility police officers regularly carry out patrols to help prevent and detect purse dippers operating in the City Centre shops and market stalls.

In February, police arrested five dippers in just two days thanks to Safer Neighbourhood Team officers working with the Council's CCTV operators.

To help reduce the chances of your possessions being stolen, you should keep your bag zipped up with the zip facing you.

Try not to withdraw large sums of cash, don't leave your mobile phone in your back pocket and keep an eye on elderly or vulnerable people.

Former England striker Alan Shearer, now a BBC TV football pundit, was also guest of honour at another event, the opening of the FORTIS gym at Harpenden Leisure Centre.

FORTIS is a new high-intensity workout which is suitable for people of all fitness levels and ages.
