It's Sustainable St Albans Week!



This week is Sustainable St Albans Week 2018. Until Sunday 29th April, groups and organisations all over the District will be holding events to encourage and promote sustainability. With over 100 events taking place, from woodland walks to bread-making, there is plenty for you and your family to get involved in.

Sustainable St Albans Week is led by a group of local people who aim to show that each of us individually can make a difference.

On Sunday 29th April, the week will culminate in the Know How Festival, 10am-4pm at Fleetville School. This day-long fun, family-friendly event will feature dozens of workshops to share skills and knowledge, music, short films and local food. Come along and get the know-how on things like cycling safely, home energy efficiency, fixing things and cooking and growing food.

Refill St Albans

Refill St Albans is a local initiative that aims to make St Albans a more sustainable City. It is encouraging residents and visitors to refill water bottles for free at a network of registered businesses, in order to reduce the number of disposable bottles used and cut unnecessary plastic waste.

The scheme is a 'City to Sea Initiative' which originally started in Bristol and has since spread to other areas of England.

The Refill St Albans Partnership is made up of the District Council, Affinity Water, Plastic Free St Albans and the Business Improvement District. We have been busy getting local businesses involved and on board. There are currently 45 places in St Albans where you can fill up on water for free. By the end of the year the Partnership will be installing two free water refill points in St Albans City Centre and Verulamium Park.

If you would like to see which businesses have committed to offering free refills, download the <u>Refill App</u> to your smartphone and look out for the logo in shop windows. If businesses want to get on board all they need to do is register themselves on the <u>Refill App</u>.





Plastic Free St Albans





Plastic Free St Albans is a new local group encouraging local businesses to reduce their impact by reviewing how they use singleuse plastics.

You can support this campaign by:

✓ refusing unnecessary disposables such as straws, stirrers and condiments,

 ✓ remembering to take your reusable items with you (e.g. bag, cup, bottle and cutlery), \checkmark not using products with microbeads in them,

 \checkmark encouraging local businesses to commit.

Minimum energy efficiency standards April 2018

Minimum energy efficiency standards come into force from 1st April 2018 which say that all properties rented need to be EPC E or above.

If you rent out a property you may need to take action to ensure you raise the energy efficiency to appropriate levels.

Save energy by unplugging unused chargers

A typical household wastes £50-£80 per year on chargers that are left in sockets but not charging anything.

Remove chargers from plug sockets when they are not in use to save money and reduce unnecessary emissions.

You could use your savings to purchase some LED light bulbs. Each LED light bulb you replace in your home can save you up to £10 per year in energy costs.



Hertfordshire Warmer Homes

Help for people to stay warm at home

Rising energy costs and energy inefficient homes mean that for some residents, the cost of fuel is disproportionately high. For some residents, this might mean the difference between heat or food.

The Herts Warmer Homes scheme aims to help people who are vulnerable to the cold. This may be because they live in a cold home and are on a low income or are young/old or disabled, or have a medical condition which is aggravated by the cold.

Eligible residents can receive things like free or subsidised home insulation, boiler repairs, heating replacements and energy switching or bill advice.

Often the people who need help the most do not see themselves as vulnerable so don't sign up for these schemes. If you know of anyone who might have difficulty staying warm and safe in their home please offer to refer them to the scheme. The funding only available for a few months more so even if the temperature has warmed now, they could still get help in time for next winter!
